



HUNGER DOESN'T TAKE A HOLIDAY.

THOSE NASTY BIRDS WILL RETURN SOON

Even though the Egrets and Blue Herons are gone for now, they will return soon. We usually see them circling in late February or March. When you see them circling, they are looking for a nesting place. Many times birds from the previous year will return to former nesting sites and their young ones will follow. Each year a mature female bird will lay between 5 and 6 eggs. Of those 5 to 6 young, most will return the following year with their parents, thus multiplying exponentially each year.

The birds usually roost near water. However, they can also roost miles away. We have significant bodies of water within a few miles of our neighborhood. So they find our trees a very nice place to call home year after year. If we don't take action to discourage them from staying here, we will have a problem similar to <u>Carrollton-Farmers Branch had recently.</u> Texas Parks and Wildlife's Urban Biologists suggest making water cannon. It is really simple. Just attach a long piece of PVC pipe to the end of a water hose. This can extend the water hose up to 12 feet. At the site of the first bird circling just turn on the water, aim and shoot. This will sufficiently discourage them and they will move on. Another way is to place shiny, Millar balloons in the trees. Helium-filled balloons will last two to three days and then will have to be replaced. Both methods will work, but perhaps the most effective is to remove the empty nests before the birds return.



Now that the leaves are off the trees, it is easy to see the large nests the birds left behind last season. We have several responsible and reasonable tree services used in the neighborhood. Contact one of them and have them take down the nests. It is not a project you want to take on yourself. If we work together we can prevent the overtaking of these beautiful but nasty birds.

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CHANGES IN NEIGHBORHOOD REVITALIZATION PROGRAM

As many of you have noticed, our street sign topLast month I met with Mr. Kevin Kass of the city's Planning Department to discuss the changes in the proposed Housing Incentive. Some meaningful changes were made after our neighborhood meeting in August. Several neighbors had expressed concern about the requirements at that time.

After several weeks of discussion, some major changes were made. There are two tiers in the program. The first tier is aimed at improving the curb appeal of an existing house. The major points are as follows:

Total improvements cost must be at least \$15,000 not to exceed \$50,000 as documented through material and contractor receipts.

\$15,000 minimum cost represents approximately a 10% investment in the median improvement value in the pilot assessment area.

Participants will receive a one-time lump sum payment equal to 25% of the cost of qualifying exterior improvements which are primarily visible from public rights-of-way.

This plan is **the final offering**. It has been approved by the City Council and applications will be available in the Planning Department January 1, 2012.

Eligible External Improvements may include but not limited to:

Foundation repair

Replacements of soffits and fascia

Replace roof-includes deck and underlayment as needed

Replace siding

Replace windows

Replace front driveway

Replace wooden fence

Replace exterior doors including garage doors

Security features

Add or repair front porch

Repaint house – color must be consistent with neighborhood

Install landscaping in front yard

Install irrigation systems in front and side yards

Install or replace gutters

Additional renovations/repairs will be considered upon request.

All improvements must be completed within 12 months of approval.

This is a great program for our neighborhood. If you need a little updating, now is the time to do it. This 25% rebate is a good thing!

A REMINDER ABOUT CODE ENFORCEMENT

Sometimes we forget some of the more obscure codes that we have to remember. We hear frequently about putting trash out too early, too many cars on unsurfaced areas, tall weeds, fences in disrepair, etc. One we don't hear about often but is still very important is blocking the sidewalk. It is against Irving Code to block a sidewalk with a vehicle, brush or other large and bulky items.

Enforcement officers have received an increase in blocked sidewalk complaints and will be stepping up their enforcement. We have many walkers in our neighborhood, so please be sure your car doesn't block the sidewalk or

tree or brush trimmings don't hang over the sidewalk. Both situations can be a hazard especially now that it is getting dark earlier and earlier.

The home of Phillip and Kelly Story, 712 Grauwyler, has been selected for the October, 2012 Yard-of-the-Month. This is a mature landscape with a large variety of plants. The Turks Cap, Lantana and Canna's bloom nicely in late summer and fall.








YARD OF THE MONTH - NOVEMBER

A LITTLE HISTORY

This ad appeared in the February 24, 1963 edition of the News Texan, (Irving's hometown newspaper, published every day except Saturday and Monday). Hard to believe, isn't it, that a luxury home in a new neighborhood could be purchased for as little as \$22,500? This was a lot of money in the '60's. Many of the homes in our neighborhood were "custom built" homes. The Buyer chose the lot (wooded lots were premium) and the Builder built the home according to the Buyers' specifications. Builders in this area included, P.B. Leach, H.L. Bush, Zach Langston, Frank Maykus, Jack Sears, Buck Buchanan, and Kenneth Reynolds to name just a few. It's hard to imagine how little \$22,500 will buy today, maybe a car? Many families during the 1960's still had only one vehicle per family. It's also difficult to imagine those huge old cars navigating the swing driveways at the back of homes in the neighborhood, especially during a time when "station wagons" were very popular. But then again, gasoline was probably no more than .29 cents per gallon. (But this is another future article.)

This pretty, new, neighborhood was home to, Teachers, Preachers, Lawyers, Accountants, Airline Pilots, Postal Workers, City Workers, Bankers, Builders, Pharmacists, Dance Instructors, Dentists, Doctors and many other occupations.

The Hospital District was a most popular neighborhood; beautiful homes, wooded lots

and right next door to the new Community Hospital. The Hospital District remains a popular destination today.
